There are two ways to invert the subject and the verb.

be/have/modal/auxiliary verb + subject + main verb

After adverbs with 'restrictive' / negative meaning: Hardly (ever)when Scarcely Rarely Barely Little Never (before) Seldom	Little did we realise the true extent of his involvement. Never had they experienced such behaviour. Hardly had the guests arrived when the bell for supper was rung.
Only + time expression or prepositional phrase	Only later did Dickens produce full novels Only with a great deal of effort was he able to escape.
Only + conjunction (inversion in main clause!!!) Only if, only after, only by, only when Not until/till	Only if the weather improves will the golf tournament take place.
In no way At no time Under no circumstances On no account	At no time during the operation did the patient regain consciousness. Under no circumstances can refunds be given.

So + adjective +that clause	So intense was the heat (that) the firefighters were unable to enter the building for two hours .

With so, neither, nor, as to express agreement.
 e.g. 'I like candies'. 'So do I' (we use 'so' to agree with an affirmative statement)
 'I don't like candies' 'Neither do I' (we use 'neither/nor' to agree with a negative statement)

 With should, were, had when they come at the beginning of an ifclause instead of "if"

Type 1: Should Jane come, let me know

Type 2: Were I you, I wouldn't say anything

Type 3: Had they been told, I would have offered my help.

main verb + subject

 After verbs of movement or adverbial expressions of place when they come at the beginning of a sentence.

Outside the door was a dog.
On the sofa sat an old man.
Here comes the bride.
There goes the taxi.

If the subject is a pronoun, there is no inversion.
 Here she comes (NOT: Here comes she)
