## Conditional sentences Type 3

We use the third type of conditional sentence:

- To express regret about a situation in the past
- Hypothesis about the past
- Theoretical past situation
- An impossible situation because it had already happened
- Regret

**Structure:**

If	Subject	had + past participle verb (PAST PERFECT TENSE)	...,	Subject	would wouldn't	have	past participle verb
----	---------	----------------------------------------------------	------	---------	-------------------	------	----------------------

Example Sentences

If you **had worked** harder, you **would have passed** your exam.

If she **had found** his phone number, she **might have called** him for the party.

If I **could have spoken** English very well, I **would have talked** to the tourists in Paris.

If I **had found** her address, I **would have sent** her an invitation.

If she **had driven** carefully, she **wouldn't have had** an accident.
