

There is / There are

+ **There is** et **There are** signifient "il y a" en français.

On utilise **There is** lorsque ce qui suit est au singulier

Ex : **There is** a Secondary School in Norwich. (*Il y a un lycée à Norwich*)

On utilise **There are** lorsque ce qui suit est au pluriel

Ex : **There are** lots of parks in Norwich. (*Il y a beaucoup de parcs à Norwich*)

- Pour dire "il n'y a pas", on dira : **there isn't** ou **there aren't**

? Pour dire "Y a-t-il...?", on dira : **Is there** ...? ou **Are there** ...?
