No one is quite sure, as the origins of the term 'flea market' are not certain. Some people believe it **originates** from the Dutch language, others think it stems from French. But there is one thing that almost everybody agrees on: there's no better place to shop if you are **in search of** a good bargain.

There are **countless** flea markets all around the world, and they are especially popular in Europe. One of the busiest markets in Europe is in the town of Lille, Northern France: La Braderie. With two hundred kilometres of open air stalls, this flea market offers a **massive diversity** of things to buy at reduced prices. Unfortunately, this amazing event, which has over a million visitors, is only an annual event which happens during the first weekend of September. Another **shopper's paradise** is in Russia.
