1. Ed Gein:



The man whose 1_____ acts inspired Psycho, Silence of the Lambs and The Texas Chainsaw grew up in an isolated area of Wisconsin. He was an 2_____ child of an alcoholic father and a mother who made him 3_____ women. When his father, brother and mother 4_____ within a 5-year period, he was left alone at the family farm.

Thirteen years later, 5_____ arrived at the farm, regarding Bernice Worden 6_____. They discovered Worden's headless 7_____ hanging.

The police found 8_____ turned into household items such as chairs and bowls, and a vest made up of a human torso. He claimed that he was using the body parts to assemble a new version of his beloved mother.

Gein was 9_____ with schizophrenia and declared unfit for 10_____. He spent the rest of his life in a mental hospital.

2. John Wayne Gacy:

John Wayne Gacy was a friendly man who threw popular block parties, and often performed as a clown at local children's parties. In 1978, when a 15-year-old boy who had last been seen with Gacy went 1_____, police obtained a 2_____ for Gacy's house. There they found clothing belonging to several young men previously reported missing. In a space beneath the house, where a 3_____ was present, they found the 4_____ of 29 boys and teenagers that Gacy had raped and 5_____.

Gacy's ex-wife had 6_____ about the odor for years too.



Gacy admitted to killing several additional men, 7_____ of their bodies in a nearby lake. His attempts at presenting an 8_____ failed, and he was convicted on 33 counts of murder and executed by 9_____ in

1994.

3. Jeffrey Dahmer:

Jeffrey Dahmer 1_____ his first murder in 1978, when he was just 18. He would go on killing until his arrest in 1991, after an African American man escaped his clutches and went to the police near Milwaukee,



Wisconsin. When the victim led police back to his 2_____ apartment, they discovered photographs of 3_____, the severed heads and genitalia of several other men and a tub full of acid that Dahmer had used to dispose of some of his 17 victims.

Dahmer's sensational trial, featuring lurid descriptions of him eating the body parts of some of his victims and admissions of necrophilia, renewed the world's interest in serial killers. In 1992, Dahmer was 4_____ to 957 years in jail, but was killed by a fellow 5_____ just two years later.

4. Ted Bundy:



Handsome, well-educated and charming, Ted Bundy focused primarily on attractive college students (30). He managed to escape police 1_____ not once, but twice, while 2_____ in Colorado. He moved to Florida, where he killed several members of a sorority and his 3_____, a 12-year-old girl who he raped and murdered.

It was the first murder trial to be fully televised, and featured Bundy acting as one of his own 4_____. He became a media star, welcoming interviewers to his 5_____, receiving letters of admiration from fans (and even marrying one of them) and providing an endless list of 6_____ about additional murders he may have committed, in the hopes of delaying his 7_____. It didn't work; he was executed in the 8_____ in 1989, with the true number of his victims unknown.
