Articles

An article accompanies a noun. There are two kinds of articles: definite and indefinite.
There is only one definite article and it is the word "the". A definite article points to a specific thing.
Example:
The chair is uncomfortable. →Here, we are talking about a specific chair.
There are two indefinite articles and they are "a" and "an". You use the article "an" when the word after the article begins with a vowel. You use the article "a" when the word after the article begins with a consonant.
Examples:
 an apple → Apple begins with the letter a, which is a vowel a banana → Banana begins with the letter b, which is a consonant
An indefinite article identifies that you are talking about one thing, but it is not pointing to a specific thing.
Example:
I want to eat an apple. → Here, we could be talking about <u>any</u> apple.
