Reminder:

A pronoun is a word that replaces a noun.

Demonstrative Pronouns

Demonstrative pronouns take the place of a noun that has already been mentioned.

Singular:

This

That

Plural:

These

Those

This and these are used when the noun is close to you (important to you or nearby).

That and those are used when the noun is not close to you (important or nearby).

Example:

I was telling you about **this** podcast.

Gerald wants **these** posters put up all over the place.

That was the worst movie I've ever seen.

No, Carol wanted **those** shoes.
