REMEMBER!

We use the **Present Tense** to refer to routines or actions that take place at the moment of speaking.

We use the **Past Tense** to talk about actions that started and finished in the past.

We use the **Present Perfect Tense** to talk about actions that started in the past and continue or have an effect in the present.

We use the **Past Perfect Tense** to talk about actions that happened before other actions in the past.
