

Demonstrative and Interrogative Pronouns

An **interrogative pronoun** comes at the beginning of a sentence to ask a question. The interrogative pronouns are **who, whom, whose, which, and what**.

A **demonstrative pronoun** is used to point out something. The demonstrative pronouns are **this, that, these, and those**.



Pronouns do not modify nouns. Are the italicized words pronouns in these sentences?
