Demonstrative and Interrogative Pronouns

An interrogative pronoun comes at the beginning of a sentence to ask a question. The interrogative pronouns are who, whom, whose, which, and what.

A demonstrative pronoun is used to point out something. The demonstrative pronouns are this, that, these, and those.
