ROSA Cleeson is a police artist. She interviews witnesses and draws the people that they describe.

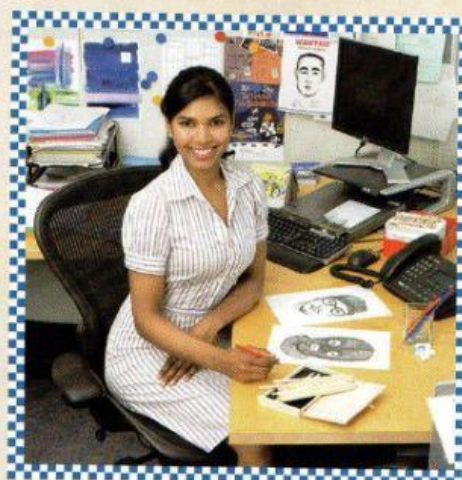
She told me that artists often got better results than computers. 'Technology is improving all the time, so a computer will probably replace me one day,' she said, 'but it hasn't happened yet!'

I asked her to tell me some of her secrets. First, she said that she always made friends with the witnesses. 'When people relax, they remember more,' she explained.

Next, she told me that she chose her questions carefully, because she didn't want to suggest ideas to the witnesses.

She also told me that she watched the witnesses' faces. 'If their eyes look left, they are remembering. If they look right, they are guessing.'

Finally, I asked her about the first job she had ever done for the police. She told me it had been a difficult case, and that she would never forget it.
