
Welcome to the Games Club Blog!

Next Week

Did you know that some board games are over 5,000 years old? Next week, we'll take a look at one of the oldest—Go. Have you ever played it? It's one of my favorites.



It's for two players, and it's very simple to play. You start with an empty board. If you're just starting to play, you can play with a board that's nine lines by nine lines. Then, you need "stones." One person has black stones, and the other has white stones. You take turns putting a stone on the board. The aim of the game is to put stones around empty spaces to make "territories" (areas) or to put stones around the other player's stones to "capture" them.

I like it because the rules are simple, but the game can be very complex. It can change very quickly, and surprising things can happen.
