

## Verb Tenses

To conjugate a verb, you also need to know when your action is happening. This is where you use verb tense.

There are many verb tenses in English. This year we will be learning the Simple Present, Simple Past, Simple Future, Present Continuous, Past Continuous, and Future Continuous.

The *simple* tenses are your basic present (now), past (then), and future (later). The *continuous* tenses show something that is ongoing or happening for a while.

Here is an example of a regular verb (*to live*) conjugated in all six tenses:

Simple Present	Simple Past	Simple Future
<b>live</b>	<b>lived</b>	<b>will live</b>
Present Continuous	Past Continuous	Future Continuous
<b>am living</b>	<b>was living</b>	<b>will be living</b>

With a regular verb, the additions are predictable. Add -ed for your simple past. Add the word will before the simple present for your simple future.

Some verbs, however, are irregular. This means that they do not follow the regular pattern. This is the case of the verb *to eat*:

Simple Present	Simple Past	Simple Future
<b>eat</b>	<b>ate</b>	<b>will eat</b>
Present Continuous	Past Continuous	Future Continuous
<b>am eating</b>	<b>was eating</b>	<b>will be eating</b>

You can see that the Simple Past does not follow the rule. Instead of adding -ed, it changes completely. This makes it an irregular verb.

Present Continuous	Past Continuous	Future Continuous

E. Conjugate the regular verb **to watch** in each of the tenses.

Simple Present	Simple Past	Simple Future
Present Continuous	Past Continuous	Future Continuous
