- >Adjectives are words used to modify or describe a noun or pronoun.
- >Adverbs are words used to modify an adjective, a verb or an adverb.
- A)There are 3 forms of adverbs or adjectives used to show varying degrees of comparisons:
- 1.- Positive form: There is no direct comparisons.

Big, happy,long, healthy,late, good.....

- 2.- Comparative form: We compare two things.
- *My dog is bigger than your dog.
- * This term is harder than last term.
- *A dolphin is more intelligent than a cat.
- 3.- Superlative form: When more than two things are being compared with one another.
- *Jenny is the tallest girl in her class.
- *This book is the most interesting in my library.
