

Have to/Modal Verb for Obligation

Affirmative	Negative
I have to	I don't have to
You have to	You don't have to
He has to	He doesn't have to
She has to	She doesn't have to
It has to	It doesn't have to
We have to	We don't have to
They have to	They don't have to

NOTE: We use **have to**, to talk about something we must do, because somebody told us or because **It's a rule**.
