Prepositional Phrases

A preposition is a word that shows the relationship of one word to another word in the sentence.

Examples: <u>prepositions</u> show a relationship of a *word* to *another word in the sentence* Put the *milk* <u>in</u> the *fridge* before it spoils.

There is a monster under the bed.

Anthony walked to school.

A prepositional phrase is a group of words that includes the preposition and the object of the preposition – the words that are being linked to the sentence by the preposition.

In the first example, the prepositional phrase is **in the fridge**. The preposition is **in** and the object of the preposition is **the fridge**. In the sentence, the preposition **in** tells us where the milk (subject of the sentence) should go.

In the second example, the prepositional phrase is **under the bed**. The preposition is **under** and the object of the preposition is **the bed**. In the sentence, the preposition **under** tells us where the monster (subject of the sentence) is.

In the third example, the prepositional phrase is **to school**. The preposition is **to** and the object of the preposition is **school**. In the sentence, the preposition **to** tells us where Anthony (subject of the sentence) went. As we can see in this example, a prepositional phrase does not always include an article.

Other examples of prepositional phrases without articles:

- beside you
- with my friend
- under Kayla's shoes
