

## **Christmas in Australia**

In Australia, Christmas comes in the towards the start of the summer holidays. Children have their summer holidays from late December to early February, so some people might go camping at Christmas.

Because it's so hot at Christmas time in Australia, there are often big bush fires across the country. Volunteer bush fire fighters help to save people and houses. They travel from all over Australia to help in other states.

Australians decorate their houses and gardens with Christmas trees and Christmas lights. Sometimes, they decorate as early as December 1st. People hang wreaths of holly on their doors. Neighbours sometimes have competitions to see who has the best lights. Neighbours often visit each other at night to look at each other's lights. One street in Sydney raises over \$35,000 every year for charity with their street display!

Australians also decorate their houses with Christmas Bush, a native Australian tree. It has small green leaves and cream-coloured flowers. In summer, the flowers turn a deep shiny red over a few weeks (usually by the week of Christmas in Sydney).

Many cities and towns have Carols by Candlelight. Famous Australian singers lead crowds singing Christmas songs and waving candles, while many more watch it on television. Many towns and cities have festivals and parades. Many local parks have a fireworks display.

Many towns, cities and schools also hold their own Carols by Candlelight services, with local bands and choirs sometimes helping to perform the Christmas carols and songs, leading big crowds in the singing. Since it is the middle of summer, Australians change the words in the carols about snow and the cold winter to special Australian words. There are also Australian carols.

When Santa comes to Australia, he sometimes gives the reindeers a rest and might use six kangaroos called "white boomers." He also often changes his clothes for cooler ones! Children often leave out carrots for Santa's reindeer and some cake and a nice cold beer for Santa (although drinking and driving the sleigh doesn't seem a good idea to me!).

Families give each other presents on Christmas Day. Workplaces and clubs might have a "Kris Kringle." You get someone's name and give them a present at the work Christmas party.

The day after Christmas is called Boxing Day. On Boxing Day most people go and visit their friends and often have barbecues at the beach. Two popular sports also start on Boxing Day: Australia challenges another country to a test cricket match and there is a famous yacht race from Sydney to Hobart in Tasmania.
