### Avoiding Wordiness and Redundancy

**Wordiness** is when a writer uses more words than necessary to get his or her point across. For example, a writer may say "In this day and age, teenagers are too reliant on cell phones." Instead, a writer should say "Now, teenagers are too reliant on cell phones." This second sentence cuts 4 words and says exactly the same thing.

**Redundancy** is when a writer repeats him or herself. For example, a writer might say "I'm going to ask a question about redundancy." The word "asking" implies that you are going to pose a question. That writer should instead say "I'm going to ask about redundancy."
