PAST PERFECT VS. PAST PERFECT CONTINUOUS

PAST PERFECT

Had + Past Participle

- Express a past action, already finished when another past action happened

E.g. I met them after they had divorced each other.



PAST CONTINUOUS

Had been + V-ing

- Describe a past action which started in the past and continued to happen after another action or time in the past

E.g. Sara had been working here for two weeks when she had the accident.



Past Perfect Continuous

focuses on the duration of the activity



Past Perfect Simple

suggests something more permanent than the **past perfect continuous**, which can imply that something is temporary.



The reason to write a verb in the **past perfect tense** is to show that it happened before other actions in the same sentence that are described by verbs in the **simple past tense**.

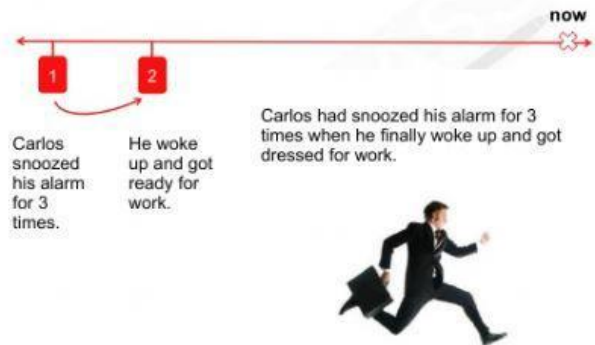

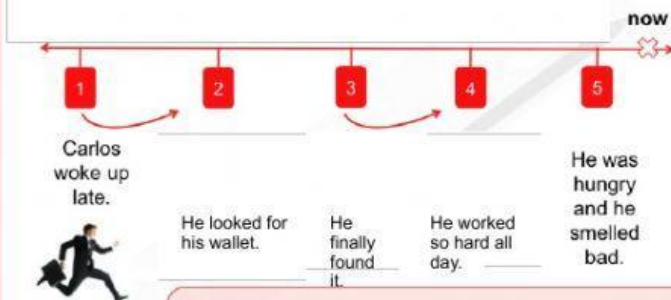
