

How Does Science Fiction Predict Future?

Science fiction introduces us to the unreal worlds that often sound like a dream. But humanity made huge technological progress over the past 100 years, and science fiction **predicted** many of the ideas.

The Lunar Landing

In his 1865 book, *From the Earth to the Moon*, Jules Verne **described** **lunar landing**, which took place in 1969.

Surveillance cameras

George Orwell's 1949 novel *1984* predicted many aspects of today's modern world. George Orwell described the mass **surveillance** cameras in his book, and half a century later it became part of the real world.

Credit and debit cards

Even what you pay with on was predicted over a century ago. Edward Bellamy introduced the term 'credit card' to the world in his 1888 novel *Looking Backward*. The people of his future didn't use paper money; they all had a card that they paid with.

Wireless headphones/earphones

In his 1953 novel, *Fahrenheit 451*, Ray Bradbury described portable audio devices as "little seashells". They became available over **decade** ago.

Virtual assistants and tablets

In the 1968 novel *2001: A Space Odyssey*, Arthur C. Clarke wrote about an electronic paper that people in this world read.

He also described the **voice-activated** super computer that resembles the **voice-activated** **virtual assistants** that are now a part of many homes and businesses.
