VOCABULARY:

The Royal Bahamas Police Force (RBPF):

In The Bahamas, one group of law enforcers is the Royal Bahamas Police Force (RBPF), established in **1840**.

MOTTO: COURAGE • INTEGRITY • LOYALTY

It is the duty of the police to arrest people who commit a crime and to bring them to court. The police work long hours, both day and night, so that law-abiding citizens can feel safe and secure.

In order to become a police officer you must:

- Be 18 years old
- A Bahamian citizen
- Be a law-abiding citizen
- Have no police record for any criminal offence
- Pass the entrance exam
- Be physically fit
- Attend the Police Training College for special training.



The **lowest rank** on the police force is that of a **constable**. An officer can then be promoted to **corporal**, **sergeant**, **inspector**, then to the **highest rank of commissioner** – the officer in charge of the entire force.

The current commissioner of Police is **Commissioner Paul A. Rolle**
