If + Past Simple, *would (not)* + verb


We use the *Second Conditional* to talk about:

1. Imaginary, an unreal situations in the present.
2. Situations in the future which are possible, but unlikely to happen.

• when the subject is *I* and the verb is *to be*, we often say *if I were*;

• we can use *would, could* or *might* in the result clause;

• we use a comma only after the "*if*" clause.
