1. \_\_\_\_\_ Holi, The festival of colors, India

Holi is known as the festival of colors. It is regarded as one of most important and vibrant festivals in India. This festival commemorates the victory of good over evil. Holi also marks the arrival of Spring, a season of hope and enjoyment. The tradition of colors in the Holi festival are linked with stories

are recommended to wear goggles to keep their eyes safe and they demand to throw only squashed tomatoes at others to avoid injuries. Every year one hundred metric tons of tomatoes are thrown during La Tomatina festival in the streets of Bunol. The week long La Tomatina festival also features music, dance, parades and fireworks.

The Carnival of Venice is one the biggest festivals in Italy. In Italian this festival is known as Carnevale di Venezia, also called as Carnevale. This event is much known for its elaborate masks. Masking is a carnival tradition and main feature in the event. Today Carnevale is one of huge celebrations in Venice, a two week long grand event. People put on masks at the vent and

6. Haro Wine Festival, La Rioja, Spain
