would, could and shall

We use *would, could* and *shall* to add meaning to other verbs. *Would, could* and *shall* are often used when you want to do things. For example:

Make polite offers (instead of 'Do you want ...?')

Would you like to see the menu?

Make polite requests (instead of imperatives)

Could you get us a cloth, please?

Ask for permission (instead of 'Is it OK if I...?')

Could I / we change the baby somewhere?

Make suggestions (instead of 'How about -ing...?')

Shall we leave a tip?
