

Past Continuous



"The teacher **was writing** on the board."

We use the **past continuous** to indicate that an action was in progress at a certain time in the past.

Form: person + BE (was/were) + verb + -ING

Example: Cindy was watching TV last night at 10.

Sometimes, this action in progress is interrupted by a shorter action in the Simple Past.

"The teacher **was writing** on the board when she saw the paper plane."

The **past continuous** can also be used to talk about two actions in progress happening at the same time in the past.

"The teacher **was writing** on the board while the students **were making** paper planes."
