It's important that you understand these concepts, so here you are a summary: **Stereotypes** are simplified **ideas** about groups of people (e.g. Boys are good at sports). **Prejudice** refers to thoughts and **feelings** (e.g. Having a negative attitude toward foreign people), while **discrimination** refers to **actions** (A hotel not admitting children).
