

Ancient Rome: Vocabulary

- A group of territories and people under the rule of one state.
- Latin for 'our sea' (Roman term for Mediterranean Sea)
- Roman peace which existed within their borders between 30BCE-180CE (over 200 years of peace and prosperity in the Roman Empire)
- The small state (lowlands) in which Rome was located
- Rule by one person, usually a hereditary king.
- A form of government in which the people choose their leaders, usually in an election.
- A person who seizes power and rules as a despot (tyrant)
- War between groups in the same country or nation.
- Absolute ruler over many different peoples and places.
- Title by which the emperor was usually known by (means worthy of reverence, majesty)
- Name given to all non-roman people living outside the roman empire.
- The main unit in the Roman army, consisted of 5000-6000 legionaries.
- Soldiers who fought on foot (foot soldiers), heavy infantry of the Roman army who were well protected and armed.

Ancient Rome: Vocabulary

- Soldiers who fought on horseback.
- An elite group of (about 10 000) troops which stayed close Rome to guard the emperor.
- High ranking soldier in the Roman army.
- Non-citizens recruited mostly from the provinces.
- A town or fort is surrounded and cut off by an attacking force.
- Buildings which housed soldiers.
- Roman tax collectors.
- Messengers who deliver government orders (traveled up to 300 km a day)
- A stone channel (bridge structure) to carry water to a town.
- Beautiful circular temple in Rome, dedicated to all gods.(built in 27 BCE)
- Coins used to facilitate trading and exchange.
- A member of the powerful landowning upper class in Rome.
- Common or ordinary citizens of Rome, the poor power class.

Ancient Rome: Vocabulary

- Crowded apartment blocks.
 - Public washrooms or latrines.
 - Richer people who support other people, a person who sponsors or helps less fortunate individuals.
 - A public meeting place where there was as much open discussion.
 - A huge stadium which could hold around 50 000 spectators to watch combats, games & shows in Ancient Rome.
 - A slave forced to fight, usually to their death.
 - Daily distribution of bread, wine and money.
 - Contribution (or tax forced to pay) taken from the conquered by the conqueror.
 - A period when prices rise rapidly and the value of money goes down.
 - Dishonest, disloyal, open to bribery and dishonest acts.
- What is handed down, left for posterity (descendants)
