

The **present perfect** can be used to talk about things you have done in your life, without saying *when* you did them. It can be used to talk about experiences you've had, or things you have done or tried in the past. In this lesson, we'll see how the present perfect is used in context, and you will talk about your life experiences by using the phrase have you ever ...?

"Have You Ever Seen The Rain"

Someone told me long ago
 There's a calm before the storm
 I know, it's been coming for some time
 When it's over, so they say
 It'll rain a sunny day
 I know, shining down like water

I wanna know, have you ever seen the rain?

HAVE YOU EVER?

We use **ever** with the Present Perfect to talk about things that you have done in your whole life. (From being a child until now):

- Have you ever eaten Chinese food? (*Have you eaten Chinese food at any time in your life?*)
- Have you ever visited Bali? (*Have you visited Bali at any time in your life?*)



Have you **ever eaten** oysters?

- Yes, I **have eaten** oysters.
- No, I **have never eaten** oysters.

Have you **ever flown** a plane?

- Yes, I **have flown** a plane.
- No, I **have never flown** a plane.



Have you **ever driven** a Ferrari?

- Yes, I **have driven** a Ferrari.
- No, I **have never driven** a Ferrari.



Interesting note: John Fogerty wrote this song about his brother Tom's departure from the band. They were very successful at the moment, and the departure was like a rain on the sunny day.

Have you ever....?

Have you ever visited with your parent a place you really loved?

Has she ever visited a place she really hated?

Have they ever used a computer like this one?

Have you ever spoken with a famous person?

The short answer is...

Yes, I have.

Yes, she has.

No, I haven't

No, she hasn't.

You can also make the negation by using **NEVER**

No, I have **NEVER** visited a place I hated

ROLE-PLAY

SINCE & FOR

- We use **FOR** to talk about a length of time, a period of time.
- We use **SINCE** to talk about a point in the past, a specific point in time.

- I have worked here **for** 8 years.
- You have played football **for** ten years.
- We have taught at this school **for** a long time.
- He has been a student **for** eight years.
- They've been married **for** 30 years.
- She has been in prison **for** 6 months.
- I haven't been on holiday **for** ages.

- He has lived here **since** 1993.
- They have been at the hotel **since** last week.
- I haven't ridden a horse **since** I was 9.
- You have worked here **since** you left your school.
- I haven't been on holiday **since** last year.
- **Since** his wife went away, he has been waiting for her.

Just, yet, still, already

- ♦ JUST → used only with present perfect and it means 'a short time ago'
Ex: Mike has just called. Can you ring him back please?
- ♦ YET → used to talk about something expected to happen. It means 'at any time up to now'. It is used in questions and negatives at the end of the sentence.
Ex: I haven't finished my homework yet.
- ♦ STILL → used to talk about something that hasn't finished, especially when we expected it to finish earlier.
Ex: You promised to give me the report yesterday and you still haven't finished it.
- ♦ ALREADY → used to say that something has happened early.
Ex: I've already spent my salary and it's 2 weeks before pay day.

just

It's used in affirmative sentences. It's placed between the auxiliary verb and the past participle. → Look, he has just arrived. It was five minutes ago.

yet

It's used in negative and interrogative sentences. It's placed at the end of the sentence. → Have you finished your task yet? Not yet, sorry.

already

It's used in affirmative sentences. It's placed between the auxiliary verb and the past participle. → Homework is finished. I've already done it.

still

It's used in negative sentences. It's placed before the auxiliary verb with the Present Perfect. → She still hasn't seen it.

PRESENT PERFECT

There are words you can use in Present Perfect.

already (+)	I've already done my homework.
just (+)	She's just gone to school.
yet (-) (?)	They haven't finished yet . Has she phoned yet ?
before (-/+) (?)	They haven't been to Paris before. They have been to Paris before. Have they been to Paris before?

PRESENT PERFECT & ADVERBS



STILL

vs.

YET



He **still** hasn't finished the report.

It has taken a long time and I continue to have to wait for it.



He hasn't finished the report **yet**.

It has not been done though I expect it to happen soon.

JUST

vs.

ALREADY



He has **just** finished the report.

It was completed a moment ago.



He has **already** finished the report.

It has been done sooner than expected.

EVER

vs.

NEVER



Has he **ever** finished the report?

Has he finished it at any time in life?



He has **never** finished the report.

At no time in his life has he finished it.

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
