The Irregular Verb VER + AudioBook – Oso Pardo (aka Oso café, Oso café)

The Spanish verb ver means "to see" or "to watch." Its conjugation is mostly regular, although the pattern varies in the past participle, visto (seen), and the first-person singular present, veo (I see). Other verbs derived from ver, such as prever (to preview or to foresee) and entrever (to partly see or to suspect), follow the same conjugation pattern. A verb that is similar in meaning is mirar, which can be translated as "to look."

Present Indicative:

The verb Ver: To see/to watch

Yo	veo	Yo <u>veo</u> las noticias todos los días.	I watch the news every day.
Tú	ves	Tú <u>ves</u> a tu hija bailar.	You watch your daughter dance.
Usted/él/ella	ve	Ella <u>ve</u> una película con su amiga.	She watches a movie with her friend.
Nosotros	vemos	Nosotros <u>vemos</u> a muchos pacientes en la clínica.	We see many patients at the clinic.
Vosotros	veis	Vosotros <u>veis</u> a vuestra abuela frecuentemente.	You see your grandmother frequently.
Ustedes/ellos/ellas	ven	Ellos <u>ven</u> muchas cosas interesantes en el museo.	They see many interesting things at the museum.

The verb Mirar: To watch/To look at

Yo	miro	Yo <u>miro</u> las noticias todos los días.	I watch the news every day.
Tú	miras	Tú <u>miras</u> a tu hija bailar.	You watch your daughter dance.
Usted/él/ella	mira	Ella <u>mira</u> una película con su amiga.	She watches a movie with her friend.
Nosotros	miramos	Nosotros <u>miramos</u> a muchos pacientes en la clínica.	We see many patients at the clinic.
Vosotros	miráis	Vosotros <u>miráis</u> a vuestra abuela frecuentemente.	You see your grandmother frequently.
Ustedes/ellos/ellas	miran	Ellos <u>miran</u> muchas cosas interesantes en el museo.	They see many interesting things at the museum.

The gerund: a form that is derived from a verb **BUT** that functions as a noun, in English ending in **-ing**; asking, running, watching...etc.

The gerundio of Ver is viendo. The gerundio of Mirar is mirando. The present continuous tense is formed by combining the auxiliary verb *Estar* with the gerundio.

Book Vocabulary: Conjugation of Ver – veo, ves, ve, veis, vemos, ven
(viendo – looking: viendome a mí – looking at me)
(Mirando – looking: me mira a mí – looking at me)
