Imagine you are walking down Oxford Street, a popular London shopping district, and you see a strangely dressed person. Do you call him an anorak? Probably not! Unless, of course, you are British.

In Britain, 'anorak' is slang for a person wearing unfashionable clothes, a boring person, or a person with a boring hobby. But where does the term come from? You'll never guess! It comes from trainspotters, because trainspotters usually wear anoraks (rain jackets with hoods) and most people think trainspotting is a boring hobby. Trainspotters spend hours on train platforms, collecting information about trains. Their anoraks protect them from the weather and they keep sandwiches and flasks of tea in the pockets. That way, they don't need to take a lunch break, and they don't miss any of the trains. How did this strange hobby start? After World War II, many British children liked to watch trains and write down their serial numbers and descriptions. In those days it was a game, but today's trainspotters are adults. There are even trainspotter clubs, usually in station cafeterias. Trainspotters often meet there and exchange information about trains with other trainspotters.

When people meet trainspotters, they sometimes ask, "Why have you got such a strange hobby?" In reply, some trainspotters answer, "Aren't football fans just as strange? They wear identical scarves and spend hours and hours in football stadiums." Do you agree?
