STRUCTURE	
IF CONDITION	RESULT
If I won the lottery,	I would buy a new house.
If I knew how to solve the problem,	I'd do it.
Past simple	Would + verb

THIRD CONDITIONAL

IMAGINARY SITUATIONS IN THE PAST

STRUCTURE	
IF CONDITION	RESULT
If I had told you,	it wouldn't have been a surprise.
If they had studied ,	they would have passed the exam.
Past perfect (had + verb PP)	Would + have + verb PP

STRUCTURE	
SECOND CONDITIONAL PRESENT IMAGINARY SITUATION If clause	THIRD CONDITIONAL PAST IMAGINARY RESULT
If I weren't so busy, If she were different,	I would have offered my help. I would have invited her.
THIRD CONDITIONAL PAST IMAGINARY RESULT If clause	SECOND CONDITIONAL PRESENT IMAGINARY SITUATION
If you had told me about the trip, If you hadn't watered my plants,	I would be in the USA with you. They would be dead now.
