

Adjectives and Adverbs

- Adjectives describe or modify nouns or pronouns. They tell what kind, which one, or how many.
 1. A **black** cat slept on the piano.
(The adjective "black" describes the noun "cat.")
 2. **We** felt **cheerful**.
The adjective "cheerful" describes the pronoun "we."
 3. **Three** windows in the basement need to be replaced.
(The adjective "three" describes the noun "windows.")
- Adverbs describe or modify verbs, adjectives, or other adverbs. They tell how, in what manner, when, where, and to what extent.
 1. Joe dances **gracefully**.
(The adverb "gracefully" describes the verb "dances.")
 2. **Yesterday**, Robert left for a weekend of camping.
(The adverb "yesterday" describes the verb "left.")
 3. Bridget is **extremely** tall.
(The adverb "extremely" describes the verb "tall.")
 4. He travels **very** **rapidly** on that skateboard.
(The adverb "very" describes the adverb "rapidly," which describes the verb "travels.")
