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Review Adverbs

Adverbs can describe **how**, **where** or **when** something happens. For adverbs that describe '**how**' we can follow this rule.

When an adjective ends in a consonant, you can just add **-ly** to make it an adverb. If the consonant it ends in is **L** then you end up with a double **L**. Below are more examples

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Adverbs can describe **how**, **where** or **when** something happens. For adverbs that describe '**how**' we can follow this rule.

If a word ends in **-ble** then the **-e** is dropped before adding **-ly**:
profitable --> profitably

If a word ends in **-y** and has more than one syllable then the **-y** changes to **-i** before adding **-ly** happy --> happily
