Being an astronaut seems like a fun and exciting job, but it's also full of danger. Since the first human flew to space in 1957, there have been many space emergencies.

Perhaps the most famous space emergency happened during the Apollo 13 mission in 1970. The spacecraft was on its way to the moon when an oxygen tank exploded. The astronauts on board had to figure out how to get back home quickly before they ran out of air. But first, they needed a way to repair the spacecraft's CO<sub>2</sub> system to keep the air they had left breathable. They figured out a solution—using just a sock and some tape!

Fire is also a big danger in space. It can destroy equipment and burn through oxygen supplies, and there's nowhere to escape to. In 1997, a fire broke out on the Russian MIR space station. It burned for almost 15 minutes, filling the space station with smoke. "The fire was so hot that it was melting metal," remembers American astronaut Jerry Linenger. Luckily, he and the other astronauts were able to put out the fire before it got too big.
