In 1996, something terrible happened. A war broke out in Congo. Soldiers invaded the forest. They destroyed plants and killed animals. Many of the workers on the reserve ran away, but Ewango wouldn't leave. He knew he had to save the forest. 'I was afraid,' he says, 'but I didn't have a choice.'One amazing thing about the Okapi Reserve is its diversity of plants. There are hundreds of native species of plants in the reserve. Vines dangle from trees. The leaves of giant ferns curve like dinosaur tails. Tall trees reach toward the sky and make a roof with their thick leaves. A strangler fig grows around another tree in the forest.
