Decide if the marked verb is stated in the Present Simple (PR), Past Simple (P) Future Simple (F) or Present Perfect Simple (PPS).

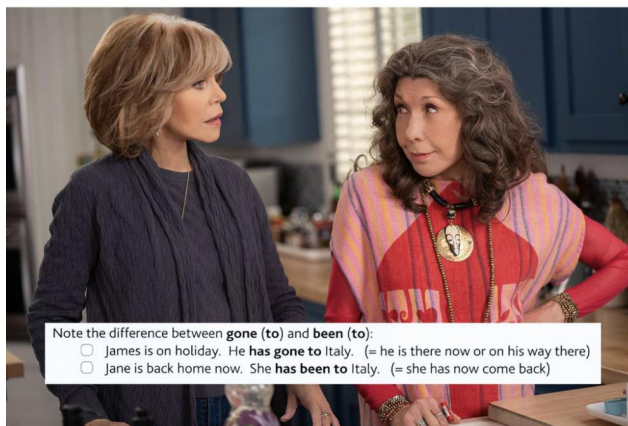
- Let's **have** breakfast and then go to work and then let's **not do** that.
