The crucifix's presence _____ (keep) the devil from escaping his form. This _____ (coerce) Satan to agree to Jack's demand: in exchange for his freedom, he had to spare Jack's soul for ten years.

Ten years after the date Jack originally struck his deal, he naturally _____ (find) himself once again in the devil's presence. Jack _____ (stumble) upon Satan in the same setting as before, and he seemingly _____ (accept) it was his time to go to Hell for good. As Satan _____ (prepare) to take him to Hell, Jack asked if he could have one apple to feed his starving belly. Foolishly, Satan once again _____ (agree) to this request. As he _____ (climb) up the branches of a nearby apple tree, Jack _____ (surround) its base with crucifixes. Satan, frustrated at the fact that he _____ (be) entrapped again, _____ (demand) his release. As Jack _____ (do) before, he _____ (make) a second demand: that he will never take his soul to Hell. Having no choice, the devil agreed and was set free.

Eventually, the drinking _____ (take) its toll on Jack, and he _____ (die). Stingy Jack's soul _____ (prepare) to enter heaven through the gates of St. Peter, but he _____ (stop). Jack then _____ (go) down to the Gates of Hell and _____ (beg) for admission into the underworld. Satan, fulfilling his obligation to Jack, _____ (not take) his soul. He _____ (give) Jack an ember to light his way. Jack _____ (be) doomed to roam the world between the planes of good and evil, with only an ember inside a hollowed turnip to light his way.
