

When we make suggestions in English, some suggestions take the **infinitive form** of the verb and others use the **-ing** or **noun** form. Here are some examples:

Suggestions (infinitive form)	Suggestions (-ing or noun form)
Why don't (subject)...? Shall (subject)...? Let's... I suggest (subject)... Examples: Why don't we <b>visit</b> a museum? Shall we <b>have</b> a picnic? Let's <b>meet</b> at the cinema. I suggest we <b>arrive</b> early.	What about...? How about...? I suggest... I recommend... Examples: What about <b>visiting</b> a museum? How about <b>a picnic</b> ? I suggest <b>meeting</b> at 4 o'clock. I recommend <b>taking</b> a taxi.
