



Adverbs vs. Adjectives



An **adjective** describes or modifies a **noun**. Adjectives often tell **what kind** and **how many**.



An **adverb** modifies a **verb**, an **adjective**, or **another** adverb. Adverbs often tell **how**, **when**, **where**, **to what extent**, and **to what degree**.
