



Sounds in English

Keep vowels short before double consonants

the vowel that comes before double consonants is always in its short pronunciation

diner dinner later latter will wheel



If *E* is at the end
of a word, it's
silent

the e is silent and it causes the
vowel before it to become long

at ate

bit bite

mat mate





Unstressed vowels make a “schwa” sound

it can happen to virtually any vowel

panda mitten bikini citrus freedom





G and *K* are always silent before
N at the beginning of a word

it's almost as if the word started with a *n*

knee knock gnarl know gnome





Pronounce *S* like *Z* at the end of a word

this happens when a word that ends in a b, d, g, l, m, n, ng, r, th or v becomes plural or an s is added

moms kings there's Michael's





Pronounce S, Z and G like a French speaker in specific words

French language had a big impact on the way English words are written and pronounced

seizure regime garage vision measure





L becomes dark near the end of a syllable

the letter l has two pronunciations referred to as the "clear l" and the "dark l"

pull milk little nibble will wheel





TH can be voiced or unvoiced

unfortunately, there's no rule for when to use which sound. That means that you'll have to memorize which words have which sound.
