Culture exchange

Sport in British schools



In the UK, all students (a) do sport at school until they are 16 – it's obligatory. Most schools have modern sports halls, gyms, sports fields and outdoor courts. Some schools also have swimming pools.

There's usually a combination of traditional sports and modern ones. Students don't usually have a choice – they (b) try all the sports. They (c) bring the equipment, the school provides everything they need. But they (d) forget to bring their sports kit, the school doesn't give students sports clothes.

At most schools in the UK, students do traditional team games, such as football, netball, cricket, hockey and rugby. Each school usually has a school team for the different sports. If the sports teacher selects a student for the team, they (e) join the team, it's their decision. The school team plays against other local schools in after-school matches.

Students can choose to study physical education for their school-leaving exams. In these classes, they (f) study sports science as well as playing sports.
