# FIRST CONDITIONAL

STRUCTURE	DEFINITION	EXAMPLE
IF + PRESENT SIMPLE, WILL	Expresses a possible future condition and its likely result.	<i>If it rains, I will take an umbrella.</i>
AFFIRMATIVE	If + present simple, subject + will + base form of the verb	<i>If she studies hard, she will pass the test.</i>
NEGATIVE	If + present simple, subject + will not (won't) + base form of the verb	<i>If they don't hurry, they won't catch the bus.</i>
INTERROGATIVE	Will + subject + base form of the verb + if + present simple?	<i>Will you come if I invite you?</i>
USE	Describes possible future outcomes based on a condition in the present.	<i>If he practices regularly, he will improve his skills.</i>
