Disappearing Snow

Can you imagine the world's highest mountains without snow? Well, according to scientists, global warming is changing the appearance of Africa's most famous landmarks. The ice cap on Mount Kilimanjaro, Africa's highest mountain, is expected to disappear in the next twelve years.

Scientists have been saying for a long time that the first signs of global warming would appear in the high altitude ice caps and glaciers of the world. The disappearance of the ice cap on Mount Kilimanjaro is the most serious evidence of this. At least one third of the ice on Kilimanjaro has melted in the last twelve years.

Fifteen years ago, the mountain's twin peaks, Kibo and Mawenzi, wore shiny ice caps but now Mawenzi is completely bare, without any snow or ice on it at all. One local, who lives at the foot of Kilimanjaro, says that many changes have taken place since he was a young boy. "When I was a child, the whole mountain was covered in snow and the ice cap was very thick. The mountain used to be hidden in clouds for months", he says.

"It's gone, it's all melted away," says Joris Thijssen, who works for Greenpeace. "This is the price we pay because nothing is being done about global warming. Here in Africa, we will lose the ice caps and glaciers."

Other researchers have seen similar ice losses around the world. The ice cap on Mount Kenya, for example, has got much smaller since 1963. Two glaciers on top of the mountains in New Guinea are also disappearing. In Venezuela there were six glaciers in 1972, now there are only two and scientists say that they will melt in the next ten years.

Perhaps Dr Guy Midgley of the National Botanical Institute sums up the problem best, "Ignoring global warming will not make it go away!"

Dogs to the Rescue

Dogs are great companions. A welcome addition to any home, they are loyal, affectionate and playful. Many dogs are excellent with children and can be especially helpful with keeping your home and family safe, as well. But did you know that apart from being wonderful pets, these canine friends have made a vast contribution to saving lives?

SAR (Search and Rescue) dogs are used in search efforts to find missing people. They are specifically trained to find victims buried under snow or debris, so they can quickly be brought to safety. In snowstorms, earthquakes and landslides, SAR dog teams are usually the first on the scene. When it comes to emergency rescues, these dogs are fast and efficient and their keen sense of smell enables them to locate accident victims much more quickly than humans.

Any breed of dog can be trained to be part of SAR rescue missions. However, they must have two basic characteristics. First, they must be people-friendly. This is important, as the missing people they find are strangers and many times the dogs have to stay with them and care for them until the rescue crew can get to them. It is also very important that they have a playful nature. This is because when the puppies are being trained, it is through fun game techniques that handlers are able to teach the necessary tasks to make them efficient rescuers later on.

Whether SAR dogs and their handlers work for a government agency or are volunteers, they go through extensive training and in many cases have to pass a certification test. During basic training, the dogs learn how to detect and follow human scents. After this, the dogs are taught a variety of tasks to prepare them for different kinds of emergencies. Avalanche dogs, for example, need to be able to dig and search in snow and very low temperatures. Other dogs are taught to walk over disaster areas carefully so as not to endanger victims under the debris.

Whatever the task, SAR dogs are not only man's best friend but in life or death situations, they are truly heroes!

Languages of Spain
