

The use of 'bring', 'take', and 'fetch'

Examples: My mother **takes** me to the market.

Please **bring** me my glasses.

Do you have to **fetch** your sister from school?

The above words 'takes', 'bring' and 'fetch' are verbs. The use of these verbs depends on the place from which the action is viewed.

'Take' is away from the place.

'Bring' is towards the place.

'Fetch' is away and back to the place.
