Context: Yesterday, I was supposed to meet my friend at the cafe, but I didn't see her there. She **might (30%) have left** early because she had another appointment.

1. **Context:** I can't find my phone anywhere in the house. I **may (50%) have misplaced** it during the party last night.

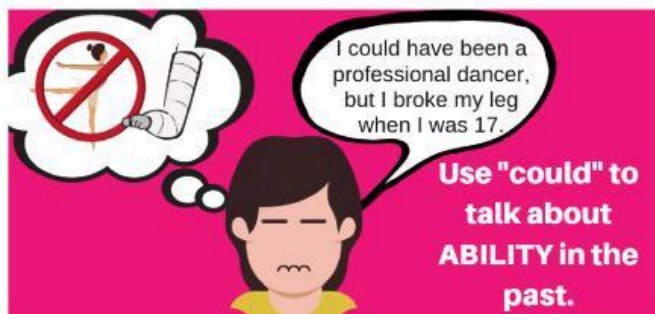
2. **Context:** The cake that I baked doesn't taste as sweet as it usually does. I **might (30%) have forgotten** to add sugar.

- b. **Answer:** She's been very busy lately, so she **might not have done** her homework yet.



IMPOSSIBILITY:

- Context:** You used to be a professional weightlifter but had to retire due to an injury. **Could you have broken** the weightlifting record in your prime?

Affirmative: Yes, I **could have broken** the weightlifting record in my prime if I hadn't been injured.

Negative: No, I **couldn't have broken** the weightlifting record in my prime because there were stronger competitors.
- Context:** You were once a skilled programmer but haven't coded in years. **Could you have done** the complex coding task a few years ago?

Affirmative: Yes, I **could've done** the complex coding task a few years ago when I was actively programming.

Negative: No, I **couldn't have done** the complex coding task a few years ago because it requires knowledge of a programming language I didn't learn.
- Context:** You were once a competitive swimmer but had to stop due to health issues. **Could you have been** a champion swimmer if you had continued training?

Affirmative: Yes, I _____ (**be**) a champion swimmer if I had continued training and hadn't developed health issues.

Negative: No, I _____ (**be**) a champion swimmer even if I had continued training because the competition was too strong.
- Context:** You used to be fluent in French but haven't spoken it in years. **Could you have spoken** French fluently at the international conference five years ago?

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Affirmative: Yes, I _____ (**speak**) French fluently at the international conference five years ago when my French was better.

Negative: No, I _____ (**speak**) French fluently at the international conference five years ago because I was already losing my fluency.

5. **Context:** You used to be an expert in ancient history but have since switched fields. **Could you have known** the answer to the complex history question when you were studying ancient history?

Affirmative: Yes, I _____ (**know**) the answer to the complex history question when I was studying ancient history.

Negative: No, I _____ (**know**) the answer to the complex history question when I was studying ancient history because it was outside my area of expertise.



Criticism:

1. **Context:** The meeting didn't go as well as expected. Could the agenda **have been** better organized?

Affirmative Answer: Yes, it **could have been** better organized. That might have made the meeting more productive.

Negative Answer: No, the organization wasn't the issue. The participants **could have been** more prepared.

2. **Context:** The project was completed, but the result was not up to the mark. Could we **have done** a better job if we had more time?

Affirmative Answer: Yes, we **could've done** a better job with more time. The deadline was quite tight.

***Negative Answer:** No, more time wouldn't have made a difference. We **could have done** a better job if we had clearer instructions.

3. **Context:** The essay received a lower grade than expected. Could I **have written** a stronger conclusion?

Affirmative Answer: Yes, you _____ (**write**) a stronger conclusion. That might have improved your grade.

Negative Answer: No, the conclusion wasn't the issue. You **could have written** a more detailed analysis in the body of the essay.

4. **Context:** The quiz was tougher than expected. _____ I _____ (**know**) the answers if I had studied more?

Affirmative Answer: Yes, you **could have known** the answers with more study. Preparation is key.

Negative Answer: No, even with more study, you _____ **(know)** the answers. The questions were unusually difficult.



MUST HAVE = only in affirmative sentences (+ positive sentence).

1. **Context:** The project was not completed on time. Could they **have done** something wrong in their planning?

Affirmative Answer: Yes, they **must have done** something wrong, perhaps they underestimated the time required.

Negative Answer: No, they **couldn't have done** anything wrong. The delay could be due to unforeseen circumstances.

2. **Context:** The car won't start. Could you **have had** the keys with you?

Affirmative Answer: Yes, I **must have had** the keys. I drove the car yesterday.

Negative Answer: No, I **couldn't have had** the keys. I might have left them at the office.

3. **Context:** The cake didn't turn out as expected. Could you **have made** a mistake in the recipe?

Affirmative Answer: Yes, I _____ **(make)** a mistake. Perhaps I mixed up the ingredients.

Negative Answer: No, I _____ **(make)** a mistake. I followed the recipe exactly.

4. **Context:** The movie was not as good as the reviews suggested. Is it possible that we might **have seen** a different movie?

Affirmative Answer: Yes, we _____ **(see)** a different movie. The one we saw didn't match the reviews.

Negative Answer: No, we _____ **(see)** a different movie. The name of the movie and the cast is the same one in reviews.

5. **Context:** The food at the restaurant was not up to the mark. Could / might they **have eaten** something different than us?

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Affirmative Answer: Yes, they _____ (eat) something different. Their experience was much better.

Negative Answer: No, they _____ (eat) something different. They ordered the same food as we did.

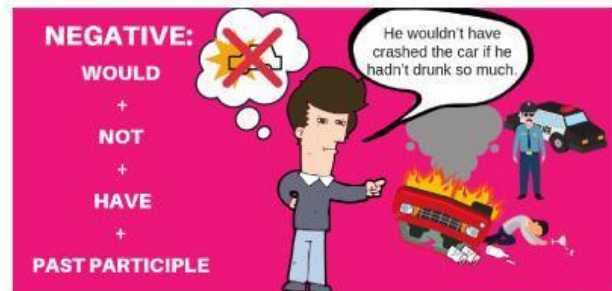
We shouldn't have turned left before, this is the wrong direction.

!!! It is possible, although not very common, to ask a question using the past of should. In this case, the speaker is asking for advice about a missed opportunity or possible mistake.!!!!

- Context:** Yesterday was your best friend's birthday. You both have been friends since childhood and share a tradition of baking a cake for each other on birthdays.
 - Question:** Should I have made a cake for your best friend's birthday?
 - Affirmative Answer:** Yes, you should have made a cake for your best friend's birthday to keep up with the tradition.
 - Negative Answer:** No, you should not have made a cake for your best friend's birthday if they specifically asked you not to.
- Context:** You went to a new restaurant last night. You love trying new cuisines and dishes, but you also have a sensitive stomach.
 - Question:** Should I have eaten the spicy dish at the new restaurant?
 - Affirmative Answer:** Yes, you should've eaten the spicy dish at the new restaurant if you wanted to try something new.
 - Negative Answer:** No, you shouldn't have eaten the spicy dish at the new restaurant if you were worried about your sensitive stomach.
- Context:** You were at a party last weekend. You enjoy socializing and having a good time, but you also had an important meeting the next morning.
 - Question:** _____ I _____ (drink) less at the party?
 - Affirmative Answer:** Yes, you _____ (drink) less at the party to be fresh for the meeting.

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- **Negative Answer:** No, you _____ (drink) less at the party if you felt comfortable and were able to handle your responsibilities.
4. **Context:** There was a rare meteor shower last night. You have a keen interest in astronomy, but it was a cloudy night.
- **Question:** Should I have seen the meteor shower last night?
 - **Affirmative Answer:** Yes, you _____ (see) the meteor shower last night as it was a rare event.
 - **Negative Answer:** No, you _____ (see) the meteor shower last night if the weather conditions were not favourable.
5. **Context:** You were feeling unwell this morning. You had a lot of work to do, but your health was deteriorating.
- **Question:** Should I have had some rest in the morning?
 - **Affirmative Answer:** Yes, you _____ (have) some rest in the morning to recover faster.
 - **Negative Answer:** No, you _____ (have) some rest in the morning if you felt that you could manage the work without affecting your health.



1. **Context:** You saw a beautiful painting at an auction last week. You've been collecting art for a few years and this painting would have been a perfect addition to your collection.
- **Question:** Would you have bought the painting if it was cheaper?
 - **Affirmative Answer:** Yes, I **would have bought** the painting if it was cheaper, considering my passion for art collection.
 - **Negative Answer:** No, I **would not have bought** the painting even if it was cheaper, if it didn't align with my taste in art.
2. **Context:** You missed your train this morning. You usually leave home at 7:30 AM to catch the 8:00 AM train to work.
- **Question:** Would you have caught the train if you had left home earlier?

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- **Affirmative Answer:** Yes, I **would've caught** the train if I had left home earlier, ensuring I reach work on time.
 - **Negative Answer:** No, I **wouldn't have caught** the train even if I had left home earlier, if there were other unforeseen delays.
3. **Context:** You met a Spanish-speaking person at a conference. You've been wanting to practice your Spanish skills.
- **Question:** _____ you _____ (speak) to the person in Spanish if you knew the language?
 - **Affirmative Answer:** Yes, I _____ (speak) to the person in Spanish if I knew the language, to practice and improve my skills.
 - **Negative Answer:** No, I _____ (speak) to the person in Spanish even if I knew the language, if the conversation required professional or technical vocabulary that I'm not comfortable with.
4. **Context:** You were offered a new type of cocktail at a party. You enjoy trying new drinks, but you were the designated driver that night.
- **Question:** _____ (drink) the cocktail if you weren't driving?
 - **Affirmative Answer:** Yes, I _____ (drink) the cocktail if I wasn't driving, to experience the new flavour.
 - **Negative Answer:** No, I _____ (drink) the cocktail even if I wasn't driving, if I didn't prefer its ingredients.
5. **Context:** You had a business idea a few years ago. You've always dreamed of starting your own company.
- **Question:** _____ (begin) the business if you had the resources?
 - **Affirmative Answer:** Yes, I _____ (begin) the business if I had the resources, to realize my dream of entrepreneurship.
 - **Negative Answer:** No, I _____ (begin) the business even if I had the resources, if I assessed the market conditions to be unfavourable.

Modal + have + participle



Modal	Concept	Example
Would have	Past unreal action	If I had guessed the future, I would have taken some precautions against what would happen.
Could have	Past unreal ability	He could have taken the flight.
May have	Past unreal possibility	We may have passed the math exam, but it was in Spanish.
Might have	Past unreal small probability	You might have sold the car, if you really needed the Money.
Should have	Past unreal recommendation	You should have listened to the teacher.
Must have	Past unreal assumption	We must have been crazy!
