

Future Tenses

To show that something will happen in the future, we sometimes use the word **will** in front of the infinitive form of the verb.

Infinitive: go

Past: went

Future: will go

Example:

My friend and I **will go** to the beach on the weekend.

You can use the contracted form **'ll** with a pronoun to say that a person will do something in the future.

I will	I'll
you will	you'll
he will	he'll
she will	she'll
it will	it'll
we will	we'll
you will	you'll
they will	they'll

We can also use **be + going to** in front of the verb to show that something will happen in the future.

Examples:

» **We are going to play** rugby tomorrow night.
She is going to eat.
I am going to travel.



Use the verb in parentheses to change the following sentences into future tense using "be + going to."

To say the negative form of **will**, we just put the words **will not** before the infinitive verb. If you use the words **going to**, write **not going to** along with the infinitive form of the verb.

Examples:

Bill Shorten **will not win** the election to be Australia's prime minister.
I am **not going to say** it again.

If we want to ask about what **will** happen in the future, we put the word **will** at the beginning of the sentence. Then, use the base form of the verb for the rest of the sentence. If you use the words **going to**, put the correct form of **be** at the beginning of the sentence, then add **going to** and the verb after the subject.

Examples:

Will we **dive** at the Great Barrier Reef? No, we **will not** dive at the Great Barrier Reef.
Are we **going to eat** at my favorite restaurant tonight? No, we **are not going to eat** at my favorite restaurant tonight.
