## MODALS: MUST/HAVE TO/SHOULD

MUST : STRONG OBLIGATION OR PERSONAL FEELINGS OF NECESSITY/  
DEBER/ NO DEBER

“WE MUST FOLLOW THE SCHOOL RULES”  
(obligation, i am obligated to)

“I MUST SEE A DOCTOR SOON”  
(advice for a specific situation)

HAVE TO: EXTERNAL NECESSITY/ “TENER QUE...”

“ I HAVE TO SEE A DOCTOR”

“ I HAVE TO STUDY FOR THE TEST”



## MUST

The **speaker** thinks it is necessary.  
Personal opinion.  
Written rules/instructions.

## HAVE TO

**Another person** thinks it is necessary.  
External obligation.  
Facts, not opinions.

*The teacher is giving the students an obligation / instructions.*

**TEACHER:** You **must** complete the essay by Friday.

**STUDENT:** We **have to** complete the essay by Friday.

*The teacher has given us the obligation / instructions.*

We use **Had to** instead of **Must** in the past tense.

- *I had to pay my speeding ticket yesterday.*

**Have to** is more common than **Must** in questions.

- *When do you have to finish the report?*

## SHOULD: DEBER / DEBERIA

### GENERAL ADVICE

**“YOU SHOULD WALK MORE”**



- I think you **should** go to the doctor. / Creo que **debes/deberías** ir al médico.
- You **shouldn't** drink alcohol. / No **deberías** beber alcohol.
- Should** I take a summer course? / ¿**Debería** tomar un curso de verano?
