Damien Hirst: Artist

Damien Steven Hirst, who was born in 1965 in Leeds, is an English artist, businessman and art collector. He is the most famous member of the group known as the Young British Artists, or YBAs, who dominated the art scene in the UK during the 1990s. He became famous for a series of artworks in which dead animals (including a shark, a sheep and a cow) are preserved. These works of art were the subject of great public debate when they were first seen. Death has been one of the principal themes in his work, and it can make a strong impression on the viewer.

Although he is internationally well-known, not everyone likes Hirst's art. There has been some very outspoken opposition to his work. Norman Tebbit, a British politician, commenting on an exhibition of Hirst's works, wrote 'Have they gone mad? The works of the "artist" are ... dead animals.' The art critic of The Evening Standard, Brian Sewell, said simply, 'I don't think of it as art.'

Hirst has been involved in many business ventures, including the promotion and direct sale of his own work. He once sold one of his complete collections for over £100 million. He is the UK's richest living artist, with his wealth valued at £270 million according to the The Sunday Times Rich List 2010. He once told The Guardian newspaper, 'Money is so important because so many people haven't got any. It's the key, isn't it? More important than languages, it's the key to the world, it can save your life. People without money can die – you can't afford an operation, you die.'
