Prepositions and pronouns are the glue that link sentences together.

Prepositions show the position of one object compared to another.

ie. Where is the position of the arch compared to the clearing?

Pronouns take the position of nouns in the sentence so we are not repeating the same word over and over again.

IE. **The arch was small. The arch was made of stone. Moss hang from the arch.**

These sentences are repetitive and the text does not flow.

By using pronouns we can vary the sentences. We can also use nouns that have a similar meaning.

IE. **The arch was small. It was made of stone. Moss hung from the columns.**
