What projects, organisations or plans do you know about that are helping the homeless or people facing other similar problems?

When people think about the problems of being homeless, they think about being cold, hungry or unsafe, but these aren't the only challenges facing someone without a roof over their head. Finding work could be life-changing, but you're probably not going to get the job if you turn up for an interview in old, dirty clothes. Suited for Success is a not-for-profit organisation based in Birmingham in the UK that helps homeless people by providing free high-quality clothes for job interviews and giving interview training. The organisation, which began as a six-month programme, has been successfully helping homeless men and women since 2015 and all the clothes are donated by local business people. To access their services you must be referred to the charity by another organisation and have proof you have an interview. I wish there were organisations like this in every town and city.

Lucy

Over the next few weeks, you'll probably be having your haircut at some point. We all know the positive feeling of looking good and how this can affect how we see and feel about ourselves. However, for numerous homeless people, this is something they'll never experience. In response to this, Stewart Roberts set up Haircuts4Homeless in London in 2014, and they now have 50 locations across the UK with over 250 volunteers. Since they started, they've given over 350,000 free haircuts to homeless people, which is around 13,000 a year. Imagine the difference this could make to someone's self-confidence! Similar projects exist in other countries, too. In Melbourne, Australia, for example, Ed Osman and his team at Barbers on Melrose give free haircuts to homeless and low-income people. For them, it's about giving back to the community and supporting vulnerable people. This is a really simple thing to do that I'm convinced makes a huge difference to the people who benefit from it.

In many cities in Spain, there are street sellers who sell fake designer clothes, handbags, sunglasses and other items on the streets, displayed on blankets on the pavement. Selling like this is illegal and if caught, sellers face fines or worse. However, some of these street sellers in Barcelona have now started a cooperative and they are producing trainers to sell using the brand name Top Manta. The trainers are not mass-produced using cheap labour, instead they're made in small workshops in Spain and Portugal which means they're ethical and they provide jobs. Their first product is the Ande Dem trainers which two local designers, Sara González de Ubieta and Helga Juárez, helped to design. With their eye-catching design and costing €115, the trainers can be purchased online or at their shop in Barcelona. When you consider that all the profits go directly to helping street sellers, I think they're well worth it. I love the fact that Ande Dem means 'walking together'.

Sonia

If you had nowhere to live, what one luxury would you choose? Rachel Cowan lives in Edinburgh, Scotland, and when she discovered that many homeless people love reading, she took action. In 2015, she started a charity called Streetreads to give books to the homeless. At first, Rachel would hand out any donated books, but over the next few years, she slowly built a collection of over 11,000 books that could be lent out. Then she started collaborating with two other charities, Simon Community and Streetwork, both of which work with the homeless, to reach more people. In 2021, Rachel opened her first library for the homeless in Edinburgh. The library provides a welcoming space where the homeless can safely sit and read in comfort, with plenty of books on offer. There are areas dedicated to popular Scottish writers, too, including Ian Rankin who is a best-selling author. Rankin has supported Rachel's work from the start and was one of the first people to donate books to Streetreads. Rachel hopes that one day every city in Scotland will have its own homeless library, and I think that's a dream worth pursuing.
